- Google Classroom (Your LMS) is like the airport.
 - Students hop a plane to get to their destination

10 Ways to use Your LMS to do More

- #1 Envision your ideal classroom
 - o Imagine your ideal LMS lifestyle
 - What is important to you as a teacher? (mission statement)
 - What kind of **academic work** do you want your students to do?
 - What do you value in **grading**? What kind of messages do you plan to send during your grading process?
 - How do you prefer to **interact** with your students?
 - What are your personal preferences for **organization**?
 - What **device** do you use most (or think you will use most) to do schoolwork?
- #2 Figure out where your prime real estate is.
 - o Prime Real Estate- The place the gets the most eyeballs
 - The banner image (first thing students see when they enter your classroom)
 - Make your own banner image
 - Google Drawings
 - File > Page Setup > Custom > 1600 X 400 Pixels (Adjust to your preference)
 - Note: the right third may be cut off on a mobile device
- #3 Make a "Right Now" section on the Classwork tab
 - Assignments are clickable and draggable into different topics
 - Your classwork page is fluid. That's an advantage!
 - Maximize the top of your assignment area
- #4 Use emojis in your assignment titles
 - o Give each assignment title a unique number
 - Add emojis
 - Mobile devices have built in emoji keyboards
 - Windows: Use Window key + period for emoji keyboard
 - Mac: Use Ctrl + Cmd + Space bar for emoji keyboard
 - Chromebook: Right click & choose the emoji option
 - Use emojis to represent content, new activities, bulleted list and more

- #5 Create assignments based on where students could go
 - o Domestic Flights: Tools inside G Suite (Jamboard, Docs, Drawings, etc)
 - International Flights: Tools not included in G Suite (Kahoot, Book Creator, Edpuzzle, Quizlet, Adobe Spark and so many more)
 - Find more apps at <u>GoogleClassroomBook.com</u>
 - What to do when you reach your destination:

 - Use YouTube for inspiration to plan your assignments

• #6 Leave feedback through voice comments

- o Mote: Leave an audio file
 - Justmote.me
 - Click the purple icon that allows you to leave audio comments in Google Classroom.
 - Students hear your intonation,
 - We talk faster than we type

• #7 Use voice to text to speed up your feedback

- Use your mobile device for voice typing
- Speeds up the feedback loop
- You can pull down the notifications and voice to text your feedback without having to open the app.

• #8 Let students leave each other feedback

- o Peer feedback helps students see their own work differently
- Go to: docs.new to create a new Google Doc quickly
 - Add students name to the doc
 - Change the sharing permissions to "anyone with the link can edit"
 - Take it to Google Classroom & Create an assignment
 - 1. Create a document with your essay
 - 2. Click the share button on the top right. Change permissions to "anyone with the link can comment" and copy that link
 - 3. Go to this document (insert the document with all the student names)
 - 4. Highlight you name and link your document to that text
 - 5. Go read three other students' work and leave comments
 - Mark Garder's framework: <u>gclass.link/spark</u>

- #9 Send a student assignment summary by email
 - Click the people tab
 - Click on individual student
 - Click the envelope button on the top right
 - Write a message to your student & check box to send student work summary
- #10 Include an "everything I know but wasn't asked" question
 - o Open a Google Form: <u>forms.google.com</u>
 - Turn this on as a quiz 1-10
 - Question 11 is an open ended question
 - Zero point question
 - Grading Question 11
 - Use the question to only add points and not take away.
